Commercial Barbering Tutor

Lisone, better known as Sone, is not your average barbering tutor. Drawing from his vast experience, Sone teaches his students not only by the textbooks, but through his wealth of experience in the barbering world.

Sone, born and raised in Porirua, is half Tokelauan and half Cook Island Tahitian-Scottish, describing himself as "a bit of a fruit salad." After upskilling through a barbering course, Sone began barbering in the Western Australia mines where he stayed for three years.

After returning from what he believed to be his most memorable barbering experience yet, Sone was yet to discover his most significant journey was still on the horizon. "I got the call to come back to WA, this time barbering for isolated Aboriginal communities."





Sone says it was "a big eye opener" helping the Aboriginal people. "For them, haircuts are very culturally significant. They wear belts that have been passed down for almost 10,000 years. After the hair is cut, they weave it into the belt."

After finishing his work in Australia, Sone felt a calling back to Aotearoa. "The community has done a lot for me, so I'd like to give back. This is the start, by teaching."

With some students already with placements, their barbering careers are taking off before they know it. "Some of my students are cutting the way I cut. It's kind of scary actually, they could be stealing customers from me. But that's how I know I'm doing my job properly and they're learning. Their hard work and their precision has got them to where they are now – out there getting jobs."

With his passion not only for barbering but for his people and the community, Sone is a blessing to the WelTec barbering whānau and continues to inspire our ākonga every day.

- Apply knowledge of barbering theory and techniques to cut hair and do beard work for clients
- Be able to talk to a client to work out what they need
- Provide client care and advice, and carry out sales transactions
- Understand all health, safety and hygiene regulations as well as professional grooming standards
